1. Welcome/ Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Vice Chair Ramirez at 10:34 a.m.

3. Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Ramirez led the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. Oath of Office for New VCREA Board Members

Carlos Juarez of the City of Santa Paula, Ed Jones of the City of Thousand Oaks and Bernardo Perez of the Ventura County Community College District were sworn into office by Sue Hughes, Executive Director, Ventura County Regional Energy Director

5. Election of Chair and Vice Chair

Upon motion of Ms. Moran, seconded by Ms. Ramirez, the Board elected Linda Parks as Chair. Upon motion of Ms. Weir, seconded by Mr. Holmgren, the Board elected Carmen Ramirez as Vice Chair.



6. Minutes from the September 20, 2018 VCREA Board Meeting

Upon motion of Ms. Weir, seconded by Mr. Holmgren, the Board received and filed the Minutes of the September 20, 2018 meeting. Mr. Jones abstained.

7. Agenda Review

The agenda was approved as presented by consensus.

8. Public Comments

Jan Dietrich presented information regarding climate change, cities participation in higher building standards, and the recommendation that the county develop a sustainability office. Ms. Dietrich provided pamphlets to the Board and attendees to review.

Leslie Purcell addressed the board regarding the encouragement of more solar panels in the area.

9. Board Member Comments

Ms. Weir addressed the Board regarding a conference she attended in Washington, DC. FEMA is looking at a large amount of funding to be spent on preemptive and resiliency projects which also includes energy projects. Chair Ramirez asked Ms. Weir to provide the board with follow-up information about the conference.

Mr. Juarez introduced himself and Andy Sobel to the Board.

Ms. Moran noted that Ventura Unified is looking at installing solar on their parking structures and some administration buildings. One concern about the solar panels is bird migration and how the birds are affected by the heat emitted by the solar panels. Chair Ramirez suggested we get some information from the National Audubon Society.

Mr. Perez introduced himself to the Board. Also of note, the Ventura County Community College District is also looking into solar as well as sustainability projects.

Mr. Jones introduced himself to the Board.

Chair Ramirez noted the opt-out rate for Clean Power Alliance is under 3 percent system-wide.

Alejandra Tellez, VCREA staff, introduced all of the staff of VCREA.

10. Southern California Edison – Wildfire Mitigation, Safety & Grid Resiliency Presentation

Robert Stiens, public affairs manager with SCE, presented information regarding improvements and future improvements to the power lines and wires. He described the new process of installing coated conductor wires in high fire areas. SCE is also changing fuses on lines to fast-acting in order to detect any interruption and have the capability of shutting down quickly. Mr. Stiens provided information about cutting trees back as well as the concept of undergrounding power lines and the time and effort involved in creating an underground system. Additionally, he discussed the emergency protocols for shutting down power temporarily in high-risk situations.

Leslie Purcell asked a question regarding cutting back trees 200 feet from active lines. Mr. Stiens stated that is not the standard for SCE. SCE will work with the homeowner regarding any trees and power lines that coexist on the property.



Chair Ramirez requested contact information for Rudy Gonzalez for further questions. Chair Ramirez also noted she attended a presentation by the Local Government Commission in Yosemite, and they discussed the reuse or repurposing of trees that needed to be removed.

Upon motion of Ms. Weir, seconded by Mr. Perez, the Board received and filed the Southern California Edison presentation.

11. 3C-REN Program Update

Alejandra Tellez, VCREA staff, provided a brief overview of the current status of the Tri-County Regional Energy Network (3C-REN). Alejandra provided the Board and guests an informational flyer regarding 3C-REN outlining the program offerings. Sue Hughes addressed the Board regarding the hard work that went into receiving approval for the 3C-REN and the County has been awarded \$48 million dollars through 2025.

Upon motion of Mr. Perez, seconded by Ms. Moran, the Board received and filed the 3C-REN program update.

12. Annual Financial Audit FY 17/18

Kelly Cattanach, VCREA staff, noted every year VCREA is required to perform an audit. There were no findings in the FY 17/18 audit.

Upon motion of Ms. Weir, seconded by Mr. Perez, the Board received and filed the annual financial audit for FY 17/18.

13. Local Government Partnership 2019 Contract Amendment

Alejandra Tellez, VCREA staff, discussed the activities performed through the Local Government Partnership and that all effort will be made to meet the requests of our partners.

Alejandra Tellez, VCREA staff provided an overview of the services provided by Javier and his work with fire recovery efforts. Chair Ramirez asked Javier to attend an upcoming Oxnard City Council meeting to present information about programs and services as part of public outreach. Ms. Weir made a similar request that Javier attend a Ventura City Council meeting.



Mr. Quady recommended that Javier's work be reported to our funding partners to show regional accomplishments. Ms. Tellez stated that we do report program metric numbers to the funding agencies.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that your Board:

- 1. Approve Ventura County Regional Energy Alliance (VCREA) Contract Amendment with TRC to Complete Energy Audits.
- 2. Approve VCREA Contract Amendment with Abraxas to Complete Energy Audits.
- 3. Authorize VCREA Executive Director, or designee, to manage both the TRC and Abraxas Contracts.

Fiscal Impacts:

Source of Funding: \$160,000 in Grant funding from: Local Government Challenge Grant (\$90,000 for TRC and \$70,000 for Abraxas).

Discussion:

On June 30, 2017, the California Energy Commission and VCREA entered into a Grant Agreement in the amount of \$427,544 to develop a Ventura County Energy Plan. The Plan is funded through the Local Government Challenge Grant and comprises creating Municipal and Community Energy Action Plans and templates for jurisdictions within Ventura County. The project also includes the development of a Business Energy Efficiency Pilot Program (kWh Countdown) that conducts free benchmarking for multi-family and commercial buildings and free energy efficiency audits for municipal facilities and businesses in Ventura County and the City of Lompoc.

On July 19, 2018, your Board approved contracts for TRC and Abraxas to conduct free energy efficiency audits for municipal facilities and businesses in Ventura County and the City of Lompoc from July 20, 2018 through August 31, 2019. As of July 2019, there is approximately \$84,000 remaining in unallocated funding for energy audits. For these reasons it is recommended that your Board (1) approve the contract amendments with TRC and Abraxas to extend their services until August 31, 2020 and (2) authorize the VCREA Executive Director, or designee, to manage activities related to both contracts,

this could include a contract amendment that would not exceed funding associated with the Local Government Challenge Grant.

As per page 5, item 14 the Contract of Services is hereby amended as follows:

5. TERM

This Contract will be in effect from July 20, 2018 through August 31, 2020 subject to all the terms and conditions set forth herein.

Time is of the essence in the performance of this contract. Continuation of the contract is subject to the appropriation of funds for such purpose by the VCREA Board of Directors. If funds to affect such continued payment are not appropriated, VCREA may terminate this project as thereby affected and Contractor will relieve the VCREA of any further obligation, therefore.

The Contract of Services, Exhibit A is hereby amended as follows:

1. APPROACH TO SCOPE OF WORK FOR COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS

The project involves providing ASHRAE Level II energy audits of commercial buildings in Lompoc and Ventura County. Abraxas understands that the purpose of the energy audits will be to encourage facility managers and building owners to take action to reduce energy costs, increase profit and reduce their carbon footprint.

3. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES/DELIVERABLES

The Contractor is responsible for the following:

- 1. Reviewing the kWh Countdown program materials, including but not limited to application and program description, and providing written comments if appropriate.
- 2. Producing ASHRAE Level I or II reports for commercial facilities within the City of Lompoc and Ventura County.
- 3. Producing an ASHRAE Level II report that may be incorporated into an Energy Savings Plan for the City of Lompoc municipal facilities.

4. COMPENSATION SCHEDULE

Contractor compensation will not exceed \$70,000.

City of Lompoc Municipal Facilities

Based on the building list provided by VCREA for the City of Lompoc, the total project cost to conduct an ASHRAE Level II report for municipal facilities that are incorporated into Energy Savings Plan will be \$30,000.

Commercial Buildings

The table below identifies the rate at which the Contractor would charge to conduct ASHRAE Level I or II energy audits as described in Exhibit A for the following ranges of square feet and building types. Prices are for dollars per square foot.

The total project cost to conduct energy audits for commercial facilities within the City of Lompoc and Ventura County will be \$40,000.

Additional Cost Factors

The table below indicates whether additional costs will be applied to "more complicated" audits.

Minimum project cost	\$2,400.00. To be used when price per square foot is lower than "Minimum Project Cost" (for projects under 25,000 square feet)

The cost allocations associated with conducting the ASHRAE Level II energy audit for municipal facilities that are incorporated into an Energy Savings Plan, and the cost associated with conducting energy audits for commercial facilities within the City of Lompoc and Ventura County may be increased or decreased when mutually agreed upon by VCREA and Contractor and issued as a written to this contract.

5. TERM

Contractor is available for services from July 20, 2018 to August 31, 2020.

Time is of the essence in the performance of this contract.

Continuation of the contract is subject to the appropriation of funds for such purpose by the VCREA Board of Directors. Recommendation:

It is recommended that your Board:

- 1. Approve VCREA Contract with Wyatt Stoker to Assist with Completion of VCREA Grant Funded Projects.

Fiscal Impacts:

Source of Funding: \$55,000 in Grant funding from: Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (~\$3000); Local Government Challenge Grant (\$26,000); and Strategic Plan Funding (~\$26,000).

Discussion:

Since February 2018, Wyatt Stoker has been working with VCREA as an Energy Analyst Intern on tasks related to four VCREA grant funded projects. VCREA is requesting your Board to approve a contract for services from July 18, 2019 to August 28, 2020 with Wyatt Stoker as a Program Specialist with a compensation amount not to exceed \$55,000.

The Contractor will work closely with VCREA but also interact with Southern California Edison, Southern California Gas Company, Community Environmental Council of Santa Barbara, county staff, city staff, business owners, facility managers, and community members. The Contractor will work on the following projects and initiatives: (1) California Energy Commission Local Government Challenge Grant deliverables, (2) California Energy Commission Ventura County Electric Vehicle Ready Blueprint Grant deliverables, (3) Strategic Planning Benchmark and Community Energy Action Plan deliverables, (4) greenhouse gas inventory projects, and (5) emission reduction strategies and initiatives.

In order to complete the five projects and initiatives, VCREA is in need of additional staffing resources and would like to continue working with Mr. Stoker. For these reasons it is recommended that your Board (1) approve the contract with Wyatt Stoker and (2) authorize the VCREA Executive Director, or designee, to manage activities related to the contract, this could include a contract amendment that would not exceed funding associated with VCREA grants.

CONTRACT for SERVICES

This contract entered into this first day of July 18, 2019 by and between the Ventura County Regional Energy Alliance, (VCREA), a joint powers authority (JPA) established in the State of California, hereinafter called "VCREA" and Wyatt Stoker, hereinafter called "Contractor."

<u>WITNESSETH</u>

WHEREAS, pursuant to authority granted in the Joint Exercise of Powers Act (Gov. Code, 6500, et seq., "the Act"), the VCREA Board of Directors has the authority to engage independent contractors to perform services for the JPA, with or without the furnishing of material; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that Contractor be engaged by VCREA for the purpose of performing consultant services hereinafter described:

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED by the parties as follows:

1. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED BY CONTRACTOR

In consideration of the payments hereinafter set forth, Contractor will perform services for VCREA in accordance with the terms, conditions and specifications set forth herein and in attached Exhibit A submitted hereto and by this reference made a part thereof.

2. **PAYMENTS**

In consideration of the services rendered in accordance with all terms, conditions and specifications set forth herein and in attached Exhibit A, VCREA will make payment to Contractor in the manner specified in Exhibit A.

3. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

No relationship of employer and employee is created by this contract, it being understood that Contractor is an independent contractor, and neither Contractor nor any of the persons performing services for Contractor pursuant to this contract, whether said person be member, partner, employee, subcontractor, or otherwise, will have any claim under this contract or otherwise against VCREA for sick leave, vacation pay, retirement benefits, social security, workers' compensation, disability, unemployment insurance benefits, or employee benefits of any kind.

It is further understood and agreed by the parties hereto that, except as provided in this contract, Contractor in the performance of its obligation hereunder is subject to the control or direction of VCREA merely as to the result to be accomplished by the services hereunder agreed to be rendered and performed and not as to the means and methods for accomplishing the results.

The Contractor will comply with all of the provisions of the Worker's Compensation Insurance and Safety Acts of the State of California, the applicable provisions of Division 4 and 5 of the California Labor Code and all amendments, thereto; and all similar State and Federal acts or laws applicable; and will indemnify and hold harmless the VCREA from and against all claims, demands, payments, suits, actions, proceedings and judgments of every nature and description, including attorney's fees and costs, presented, brought or recovered against the VCREA for or on account of any liability under any of said Acts which may be incurred by reasons of any work to be performed under this Contract.

4. NON-ASSIGNABILITY

Contractor will not assign this Contract or any portion thereof, to a third party without the prior written consent of VCREA, and any attempted assignment without such prior written consent will be null and void and will be cause, at VCREA's sole and absolute discretion, for immediate termination of this Contract.

5. **TERM**

This Contract will be in effect from July 1, 2019 through August 28, 2020 subject to all the terms and conditions set forth herein.

Time is of the essence in the performance of this contract. Continuation of the contract is subject to the appropriation of funds for such purpose by the VCREA Board of Directors. If funds to affect such continued payment are not appropriated, VCREA may terminate this project as thereby affected and Contractor will relieve the VCREA of any further obligation, therefore.

6. TERMINATION

The VCREA Board of Directors or Designee may terminate this contract at any time for any reason by providing 10 days written notice to Contractor. In the event of termination under this paragraph, Contractor will be paid for all work provided to the date of termination, as long as such work meets the terms and conditions of this contract. On completion or termination of this contract, VCREA will be entitled to immediate possession of and Contractor will furnish on request, all computations, plans, correspondence and other

pertinent data gathered or computed by Contractor for this particular Contract prior to any termination. Contractor may retain copies of said original documents for Contractor's files. Contractor hereby expressly waives any and all claims for damages or compensation arising under this Contract except as set forth in this paragraph in the event of such termination.

This right of termination belonging to the VCREA may be exercised without prejudice to any other remedy which it may be entitled at law or under this contract.

7. **DEFAULT**

If Contractor defaults in the performance of any term or condition of this contract, Contractor must cure that default by a satisfactory performance within 10 days after service upon Contractor of written notice of the default. If Contractor fails to cure the default within that time, then VCREA may terminate this contract without further notice.

The foregoing requirement for written notice and opportunity to cure does not apply with respect to paragraph 1 above.

8. INDEMNIFICATION, HOLD HARMLESS AND WAIVER OF SUBROGATION

All activities and/or work covered by this contract will be at the risk of Contractor alone. Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the VCREA including its board, agencies, departments, officers, employees, agents and volunteers, against any and all claims, lawsuits, whether against Contractor, VCREA or others, judgments, debts, demands and liability, including without limitation, those arising from injuries or death of persons and/or for damages to property, arising directly or indirectly out of the obligations herein described or undertaken or out of operations conducted or subsidized in whole or in part by Contractor, save and except claims or litigation arising through the sole negligence or wrongdoing and/or sole willful misconduct of VCREA. Contractor agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against VCREA for losses arising directly or indirectly from the activities and/or work covered by this contract.

9. NON-DISCRIMINATION

A) General.

No person will on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religious affiliation or non-affiliation, sex, age, handicap, disability, or political affiliation, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits, or be subjected to discrimination under this Contract. B) Employment.

Contractor will insure equal employment opportunity based on objective standards of recruitment, selection, promotion, classification, compensation, performance evaluations, and management relations, for all employees under this Contract. Contractor's personnel policies will be made available to County upon request.

10. SUBSTITUTION

If particular people are identified in Exhibit A as working under this Contract, the Contractor will not assign others to work in their place without written permission from VCREA. Any substitution will be with a person of commensurate experience and knowledge.

11. INVESTIGATION AND RESEARCH

Contractor by investigation and research has acquired reasonable knowledge of all conditions affecting the work to be done and labor and material needed, and the execution of this Contract is to be based upon such investigation and research, and not upon any representation made by the VCREA or any of its officers, agents or employees, except as provided herein.

12. CONTRACT MONITORING

The VCREA will have the right to review the work being performed by the Contractor under this Contract at any time during Contractor's usual working hours. Review, checking, approval or other action by the VCREA will not relieve Contractor of Contractor's responsibility for the thoroughness of the services to be provided hereunder. This Contract will be administered by VCREA Executive Director, or his/her authorized representative.

13. ADDENDA

VCREA may from time to time require changes in the scope of the services required hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of Contractor's compensation which are mutually agreed upon by and between VCREA and Contractor will be effective when incorporated in written amendments to this Contract.

14. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Contractor covenants that Contractor presently has no interest, including, but not limited to, other projects or independent contracts, and will not acquire any such interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required to be performed under this Contract. Contractor further covenants that in the

performance of this Contract no person having such interest will be employed or retained by Contractor under this contract.

15. CONFIDENTIALITY

Any reports, information, data, statistics, forms, procedures, systems, studies and any other communication or form of knowledge given to or prepared or assembled by Contractor under this Contract which VCREA requests in writing to be kept confidential, will not be made available to any individual or organization by Contractor without the prior written approval of the VCREA except as authorized by law.

16. NOTICES

All notices required under this Contract will be made in writing and addressed or delivered as follows:

In all other instances, notices will be deemed given at the time of actual delivery.

17. MERGER CLAUSE

This Contract supersedes any and all other contracts, either oral or written, between Contractor and the VCREA, with respect to the subject of this contract. This contract contains all of the covenants and contracts between the parties with respect to the services required hereunder. Contractor acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or contracts have been made by or on behalf of VCREA except those covenants and contracts embodied in this contract. No contract, statement, or promise not contained in this contract will be valid or binding.

18. GOVERNING LAW

The validity of this contract and any of its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties under this contract, will be construed pursuant to and in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

19. SEVERABILITY OF CONTRACT

If any term of this contract is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be void or unenforceable, the remainder of the contract terms will remain in full force and effect and will not be affected.

20. CUMULATIVE REMEDIES

The exercise or failure to exercise of legal rights and remedies by the VCREA in the event of any default or breach hereunder will not constitute a waiver or forfeiture of any other rights and remedies, and will be without prejudice to the enforcement of any other right or remedy available by law or authorized by this contract.

21. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

Each party to this contract will comply with all applicable laws.

22. CONSTRUCTION OF COVENANTS AND CONDITIONS

Each term and each provision of this contract will be construed to be both a covenant and a condition.

Staff Report: Renewable Energy - Impacts for Wildlife

To inform VCREA Board member of impacts to wildlife from local renewable energy projects.

RESEARCH:

- Staff connected with **subject matter experts** from:
 - Ojai Raptor Society
 - National Audubon Society, Renewable Energy Director: Garry George
- Review of the **Bureau of Land Management Solar Energy Program** recommendations from technical documents
- Review of science-based research on avian-solar interactions from the Multiagency Avian-Solar Collaborative Working Group and Avian Solar Working Group
- Review of **American Planning Association** information on community plans and ordinances that address solar energy systems.

BACKGROUND:

- There are two basic types of solar energy technology: photovoltaic (PV) and concentrating solar power.
- The scale of the projects (small, medium, and large) are defined by Mega Watt (MW) capacity of the installed solar. Additionally, systems are generally sited as either ground-mounted or rooftop-mounted systems.
- As the number of large utility-scale solar energy facilities increases, so are the potential impacts on wildlife and their habitats. Recent attention is on the risk of fatality to birds.
- Understanding the current rates of avian mortality and existing monitoring requirements is an important first step in mitigation and minimization protocols.

Small & Medium (NON-Utility Scale @ Less than 50 MW) Large (Utility Scale @50 MW or greater)

FINDINGS:

Small and Medium solar panels have minimum impacts on wildlife.

Large scale solar projects have documented evidence of significant impact on wildlife.

- <u>Wildlife protection agencies are generally supportive of small scale (less than 20 MW)</u> <u>ground mounted and urban PV solar</u> panels (rooftop and parking structure varieties) and have very little documented disruptive impact on wildlife habitat, breading, or migration.
- Research for localized, <u>medium-scale solar</u> "farms" (less than 50MW) with ground base PV shows some documented mild terrestrial habitat impacts, but <u>no significant link to</u> <u>mortality or breading disruptions</u>.
- There is <u>significant documentation of negative impacts on wildlife (avian and</u> <u>terrestrial) from large, utility-scale (50 MW or greater) solar projects</u> that alter habitats, impact migration patterns, and cause mortality. Research efforts continue.

CONCLUSIONS:

Current non-utility scale solar activities within the County of Ventura do not pose serious impacts for local or migrating wildlife.

Staff Report: Blockchain How it May Play a Role in Energy -

To inform VCREA Board Members on the emerging technology of blockchain.

RESEARCH:

- Review of periodicals discussing blockchain technology and the use of it in the energy sector: **PV Magazine Program, Science Direct.**
- Review of **PG&E's Application for its 2018- 2020 Electric Program Investment Charge Investment Plan** and their evaluation of blockchain technology and smart contracts.

BACKGROUND:

- Blockchain technology it would allow homeowners, for example, to play an active role in the electricity markets.
 - Example would be a cap and trade program using blockchain (technology used to create Bitcoin).
 - These technologies could help facilitate automation of aspects of electricity delivery transaction chain, potentially creating a more decentralized market.

FINDINGS:

- A real-world example using rooftop solar a home is over producing energy; those kilowatts are given a value and they can be traded, used as credits, or used to settle on pricing. Customers could participate in a peer-to-peer trading of solar credits.
- This is a new emerging technology that still needs a lot of vetting, current potential risks include privacy and security issues, and there has not been a major rollout or a large number of users.
- PG&E is currently the only utility exploring the technology.

CONCLUSIONS:

- The new building and energy efficiency standards that require all new homes to have rooftop or community solar could create potential market for this technology.
- Automation needs to be created and there needs to be a large number of adopters in order to work.
- It could be a future tool for solar systems in California.

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Ventura County Regional Energy Alliance (VCREA), I am writing to request your assistance in ensuring continued funding from Southern California Edison (SCE) for our Local Government Partnership (LGP) program. The VCREA Board believes that continuing to fund our program will increase the region's energy savings potential in line with State and local goals. Therefore, we respectfully request the following:

• Continue to fund VCREA non-resource activities which will drive energy savings to SCE programs

• Assist VCREA in adapting to the transition of the public sector solicitation to ensure that our region still obtains consistent SCE program funding

The long-term vision of VCREA is to match all energy consumers with the best energy services available locally. VCREA engages local assets and partners in the region, along with personalized assistance to make energy efficiency easier and more accessible than ever.

VCREA has been afforded the stability of funding since 2012. SCE's ongoing support has allowed VCREA to engage with leadership from our region's jurisdictions and with private sector partners and community members to provide innovative, comprehensive, and collaborative tools that have resulted in successfully building a market that supports lasting energy savings capacity. VCREA has built robust programmatic systems, local community and workforce connections, and possesses the knowledge centered around helping customers

The risk of SCE terminating our funding will jeopardize VCREA's infrastructure and progress towards meeting energy efficiency goals. We understand the constraints you are under given the California Public Utilities' (PUC) explicit direction to be cost-effective and have a portion of your portfolio delivered by third-party implementers. But we fear that there will be continued and expanding service gaps, and our region will continue to be an underserved area. Therefore, we propose to refocus the program towards its strongest functions and reconfigure VCREA's scope to best meet energy savings goals shared by the County, SCE, the PUC, and the State.

Understanding that SCE allocates funding on an entity's total resource cost (TRC) performance, please note that VCREA, as outlined in the attached document, has had an increasing TRC year after year. Also included in this correspondence are VCREA Annual Reports, which outline specific activities leading to our TRC improvements.

We are eager to continue building upon the robust assets, services, and systems already in place and are happy to partner with SCE towards mutually shared energy and emissions reduction goals, including those targeted by State legislation. As a region at the end of SCE service territory, and far from large population centers and major service hubs, we believe that VCREA plays a key role that no other service provider is positioned to play.

Without funding, VCREA's offerings will continue to be constrained and possibly cut or terminated, leaving the jurisdictions in our region to rebuild program infrastructure to meet energy savings goals. Therefore, we respectfully request that SCE provide ongoing funding to VCREA. Building Operator Certification (BOC[®]) helps building engineers, maintenance supervisors and others in the skilled trades advance their skills and careers in energy efficient operation of commercial buildings.

Since 1996 BOC has equipped building operators with the know-how to reduce building-related energy consumption and occupant comfort complaints.

Enroll now to gain essential skills through hands-on training and a professional credential in energy efficient building maintenance. BOC training includes documentation of building equipment, systems and controls; benchmarking the building's performance; updating occupancy profiles; reviewing HVAC systems and operation; and mapping the facility's electrical distribution system.

BOC Level I is designed for operators with two or more years of experience in building operation and maintenance who wish to broaden their knowledge of the total building system. Completion of Level I requires a time commitment of 74 hours which includes seven classes, work-site projects, and open-book tests.

BOC Level II is designed for experienced facility staff who have earned their BOC Certification or a Level I Training Certificate of Completion (TCOC) and want more advanced training. Completion of Level II requires a time commitment of 61 hours which includes six classes, work-site projects, and open-book tests.
